Introduction

The Office of Migrant Education (OME) has developed an Eligibility Matrix for Federal Migrant Programs as a technical assistance document to education partners and stakeholders about the complexities of participant eligibility for these programs, and to assist partners and stakeholders in ensuring that seasonal and migrant farmworkers receive the services they need. The document compares eligibility requirements for six programs:

The Department of Education:

- Migrant Education Program (MEP),
- High School Equivalency Program (HEP), and
- College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP),

The Department of Health and Human Services:

- Migrant Health Program (MHP), and
- Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Program (MSHS),

The Department of Labor:

• National Farmworker Jobs Program (NFJP).

Other Program Provisions	Continuation of Services. Under certain conditions, participants can continue to receive services after their eligibility ends. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Title I, Part C statute (1) a child who ceases to be a migratory child during a school term shall be eligible for service until the end of such term; (2) a child who is no longer a migratory child may continue to receive services for 1 additional school year, but only if comparable services are not available through other programs; and (3) students who were eligible for services in secondary school may continue to be served through credit accrual programs until graduation.
