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# Legal References for CSPR and *EDFacts* Collection

**Title VIII. General Provisions:** Part C, Section 8303, Consolidated Reporting (ESEA, as amended through P.L. 115-64).

**Code of Federal Regulations:** 34 CFR 76.720

Applies to a State's reports required under 2 CFR 200.328 (Monitoring and Reporting of Program Performance) and 2 CFR 200.327 (Financial Reporting).

**Guidance:** MEP Guidance, March 2017, Chapter IX. Program Performance and Child Count Reporting, pages 96-105.

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# Purpose of Webinar

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# Changes from the SY 2018-19 to SY 2019-20

## **FS 121:**

- Revised definition for Priority for Services (PFS) (**FS 54**)
- Removed categories Mobility Status (Regular Year) and Referral Status

## **FS 122:**

- Renumbered sections and deleted duplicate information

## **FS 145:**

- Updated language from “participating” to “eligible”

## **FS 165:**

- No Changes

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# FS 121 Criteria

## **FS 121 following criteria:**

- State education agency (SEA) approved Certificate of Eligibility (COE)
- Eligible children ages birth through 21 years of age within the Performance Period.
- Qualifying Arrival Date (QAD) within 36 months of the start of the Performance Period (e.g., the earliest QAD for the 2019-20 Performance Period would be September 2, 2016).
- Resided in the State for one or more days within the Performance Period

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# FS 121 Exclusions

**The following children should NOT be reported in FS 121:**

- Children served by the MEP (under the continuation of services (COS) authority) after their period of eligibility has expired when other services are not available to meet their needs
- Previously eligible secondary–school children who are receiving credit accrual services under the COS provision.



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# FS 122 Criteria and Exclusions

## **A child should be reported in FS 122 if he/she:**

- Meets all the category 1 criteria (COE, Age, QAD, Residency) and,
- Has an enrollment that indicates the child received services from a MEP-funded project during the Summer/Intersession term.

## **A child should not be reported in FS 122 if he/she:**

- Did not receive services during a summer term or intersession period
- Was served under the COS provision
- Was served through a Title I Schoolwide Program (SWP) where MEP funds were combined in a school-wide campus budget.
- Only received referred services (non-MEP funded).

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# FS 122 Revised Guidance

## **Revised!** How are child counts reported by Age/Grade?

Report a child in the age/grade category in which he/she spent the majority of his/her time while residing in the State during the performance period.

There are two exceptions to this rule related to enrollment into the Summer/Intersession terms.

- The first exception deals with a two-year-old who turns three during the performance period. In order to be included in the Category 2 child count, a child must be at least three years of age **on the date of enrollment into the Summer/Intersession term.**
- The second exception to this rule deals with a child who turns 22 years of age during the performance period. In order to be included into the Category 2 child count, the child must NOT have turned 22 years old on **the date of enrollment into the Summer/Intersession term.**

This is important to note because the date of enrollment into the Summer/Intersession term is the **ONLY date that determines residency** in the Category 2 child count calculation.

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# Data Check Sheet as a Resource Tool

- Check your data before submitting files to the Education Data Exchange Network (EDEN) Submission System
- Compare numbers of Eligible Population to Subpopulations
- Use the Data Check Sheet as a guide to ensure that your quantitative data submission aligns with the Office of Migrant Education (OME) edit checks for SY 2019-2020.

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# Using the Data Check Sheet

- **Over 10%/Under 10%** - States must provide a reason for large overall increases or decreases in their eligible counts
- **OVER 25%/UNDER 25%** - Percent Change from SY 2018-19 to SY 2019-20 falls outside the range of +/-25%
- **LowN – OK** - if a data check output in Column G falls outside the range of 25%, and the response is lower than 50
- **OK** - response falls within the normal range

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# Using the Data Check Sheet Cont.

- **“OK-Eligible,”**- the response in Column F represents a number that is equal to or less than a larger population or subpopulation for which it is a subset.
- **“Greater than Eligible,”** - the response in Column F is more than the larger population or subpopulation for which it is a subset.
- **“Provide Comment” and “Check Values,”**- response falls outside the expected range in multiple questions.

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# ***EDFacts* Business Rules Single Inventory (BRSI)**

- Contains business rules applied to EDFacts data throughout the pre- and post-submission lifecycle of that data.
- Describes each business rule regarding each File Specification.
- Includes the error number, type, message, definition, edit logic, and the File Specifications where the business rules are applied

# Business Rules Single Inventory

- The BRSI includes the following two documents:
  1. the *EDFacts* Business Rules Single Inventory User Guide, detailing the layout of the BRSI spreadsheet, Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) and commonly used filters; and
  2. the *EDFacts* Business Rules Single Inventory Excel spreadsheet describing each business rule.

  - Second Open Date: Mid May
  - Second Close Date: Mid May

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# Child Count Correction/Resubmission

Process for resubmission of SEA Category 1 and Category 2 Child Count data after first submission:

- The SEA must submit an email request through the *EDFacts* Partner Support Center (PSC) to the U.S. Department of Education, OME Program Director **for pre-approval** to modify its child count(s).
- The request must include an explanation of the data that needs to be changed, why the change needs to be made, and what the State is doing to prevent the error in the future.

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# Child Count Resubmission (cont.)

- The request should be sent at least seven days (one week) prior to the *EDFacts*/CSPR Part II resubmission window.
- Resubmissions of SEA child count data with upward or downward revisions without prior approval will not be accepted by OME.
- If OME accepts a revision from the State, a formal response via email will be issued by OME's Director, Lisa Gillette.
